Context of the Studies

The COVID-19 pandemic and heightened awareness of systemic racism in law enforcement and other systems.

- Volunteer-led grassroots organizations
 (VGOs) are often the "first responders"
 to their neighbors' health and social justice
 needs. VGO's include:
 - block and neighborhood associations
 - tenant and homeowners' associations
 - civic and cultural associations, and
 - mutual aid groups

- Little engagement by public health and other agencies responding to the crises
- Limited up-to-date research on VGO leadership, capacity, or effectiveness




National Grassroots Study

Volunteer-led Grassroots Organizations (VGOs)

- Online survey with 427 responses
- 63% of the sample were from the top 30 metropolitan cities in the U.S.
- 59% identified as a neighborhood association
- Most served predominantly White and middle-class communities





Lower-Income Communities of Color (n=113)





Top Pandemic and Social Justice Efforts







VGOs' Perceived Effectiveness

Groups who felt they had been effective in addressing the pandemic or in their social justice organizing were more likely to:

- 1. Have nonprofit or 501(c)3 status; and
- 2. Say it was easier to get help when needed.

This was regardless of the type of pandemic or social-justice related efforts they had pursued in their communities.



Top Capacity Needs for VGOs

- 1. Collaborating with other neighborhood or grassroots groups (49%)
- 2. Improving community organizing (48%)
- 3. Recruiting and sustaining members (22%)
- 4. Increasing membership participation (21%)


National Intermediary Study

Intermediary Organizations

- Online survey with 28 responses and 4 interviews
- 50% of the sample were from the top 30 metropolitan cities in the U.S.
- 64% identified as a nonprofit
- Most served lower-income areas, but the primary race of the communities varied

Top Technical Assistance Offered by Intermediaries

- 1. Issue-specific workshops and webinars (64%)
- 2. Leadership and organizational development (64%)
- 3. Training on advocacy, community organizing, or coalition building (61%)
- 4. Fundraising and proposal writing (36%)



Top Networking and Fundraising Opportunities Offered by Intermediaries

- 1. Peer-learning or communities of practice (64%)
- 2. Linking grassroots leaders to larger institutions (64%)
- 3. Convenings for specific issues, coalition building (43%)
- 4. Small seed or incentive grants (under \$2,000) (39%)



Top Capacity Needs of Intermediaries

Rank	Type of Resource Needed	%
1	Additional funding for grants	74
2	Additional resources for convening nonprofits and grassroots groups	67
3	Additional staff capacity for more grant- making opportunities	59

Recommendations for Activating Grassroots Power

- 1. Continue to **develop the inventory and database** of VGOs and Intermediaries for research, monitoring, and action.
- 2. Conduct **research on what leads to VGO and intermediary effectiveness** in addressing public health, social justice, and other critical issues facing their communities.
- 3. Generate or **compile resources** that can be used by the VGOs to address public health and social justice issues.
- **4. Convene an active network or hub for intermediaries** and other support services for VGOs and related community-led organizations.
